Vannoy, of East Welling Avenue, and prominent Trenton newspaperman, in recent years vice president and Midwest manager of the public relations counselling firm of Carl Byor and Associates Inc. died on Friday in Passavant Hospital, Chicago. He was 55 years of age.

Mr. Dye, who at one time was assistant editor of the Trenton Times, resided in Chicago and had been ill since October 19th.

In March, 1953, he went to Washington to become secretary to Congressman-elect Charles A. Eaton for whom he acted as campaign manager in two campaigns. In later years he served as secretary to U. S. Senators from New Jersey, Dayid Baird, Dwight W. Morrow and W. Warren Barbour.

Funeral services were held from the Poulson and Van Hise Funeral Home, Trenton, on Monday afternoon. Burial was in the Greenwood Cemetery.

Surviving besides his sister, of this place, is a wife, Mrs. Dorothy Upchurch Pless Dye formerly of Raleigh, N. C., a daughter, Mrs. Emerson W. White, Jr., of White Plains, N. Y., and another sister, Mrs. Ralph Bloor, of Arlington, Va.
